Brenden Scott Master of Arts in Teaching

A Bay Area native, Brenden Scott was raised by his single mother in Los Angeles, where he excelled in academics and athletics. As an undergraduate at California State University, Northridge, he competed in track and field, worked as a research assistant and tutored fellow athletes in introductory and upper-level courses in mathematics, chemistry and biology. A pre-med major, he also volunteered at Keck Hospital of USC.

Looking for ways to immediately address inequities in his community, he decided to defer medical school and focus on a career in education where he could have a more immediate impact. Recognizing an urgent need for Black children to be taught and mentored by Black educators, he joined USC Rossier's Master of Arts in Teaching program. After receiving his degree and California multiple-subject credential, he plans to teach upper elementary grades and establish programs to empower Black youth and assist single-parent households. He is dedicated to improving opportunities in historically underserved communities and moving them in a positive direction toward liberation.

Robert A. Naslund Endowed Chair in Curriculum Theory and Professor of Education, USC Rossier Director of Youth Engagement and Community Partnerships, USC Race and Equity Center

Christopher Emdin is the Robert A. Naslund Endowed Chair in Curriculum Theory and Professor of Education at the University of Southern California, where he also serves as director of youth engagement and community partnerships at the USC Race and Equity Center.

He previously served as director of the Science Education program at Teachers College, Columbia University and alumni fellow at the Hiphop Archive & Research Institute at the Hutchins Center, Harvard University. He has served as STEAM Ambassador for the U.S. Department of State and Minorities in Energy Ambassador for the U.S. Department of Energy.

Dr. Emdin holds a Ph.D in Urban Education with a concentration in Mathematics, Science, and Technology; masters degrees in both Natural Sciences and Education, and bachelor's degrees in Physical Anthropology, Biology, and Chemistry.

He is the creator of the #HipHopEd social media movement and Science Genius BATTLES. He was recently named one of the 27 people bridging divides in the United States by *Time* magazine.

He is the author of numerous award-winning works, including the book Urban Science Education for the Hip-Hop Generation and the New York Times bestseller For White Folks Who Teach In the Hood and the Rest of Ya'll Too. His latest book, Ratchetdemic: Reimagining Academic Excellence, is currently available wherever books are sold.
